Please read paragraphs 422-483 and then answer the following questions:

- 1. In # 422 we are told that God the Father "acted far beyond all expectation" in sending us his own "beloved Son." What does this mean?
- 2. # 425 makes it clear that every Catholic is to proclaim Jesus Christ in order to lead others to faith in him. In other words, every Catholic should try to be a good evangelizer. In your opinion, are most Catholics good evangelizers? Why or why not? In what ways do you try to evangelize others?
- 3. Some would accuse Catholicism of being a religion of "rules and regulations"--a religion centered on <u>laws</u>. Based on what we are told in the Catechism, how would you respond to such an accusation?
- 4. "Jesus is, first and foremost, a teacher." "Jesus is, first and foremost, a moralist." "Jesus is, first and foremost, a wise man." Based on what we are told in # 430, are any of these statements true?
- 5. Why did Jesus accept the title of Messiah "with some reserve?" (#'s 439-440)
- 6. As we are told in # 441, the title "son of God" was applied to a number of different individuals in the Old Testament. How is the title "Son of God" unique as it applies to Jesus? In other words, when we use this title of our Lord, what are we saying about him? (#'s 442-445)
- 7. Jehovah's Witnesses say that Jesus is not God. How would you respond to such an assertion, given what you have read in this section (up through # 455)?
- 8. In #'s 457-460 four reasons are given as to why the "Word became flesh". How do these insights relate to your everyday life?
- 9. The Jehovah's Witnesses are not Christians. True or False? (# 463)
- 10. Some non-Catholics will refer to Mary as "the mother of Jesus" but not as "the Mother of God". What do we mean when we call Mary "the Mother of God"? (# 466)
- 11. Why can it be said that God died on the Cross on Good Friday? (# 468)
- 12. As the Catechism reminds us, the human soul that the Son of God assumed, was endowed with "a true human knowledge. As such the knowledge could not in itself be unlimited." (# 472) This fact has led some theologians to assert that Jesus did <u>not</u> always know that he was God. What would you say in response to such an assertion?
